Welcome

Welcome! God called you here! God is in the business of calling the ordinary into the extraordinary, and it is no mistake that you have been called to the work of reconciliation.

We live in divided times. We have all borne witness to the divisions. disunity, and distrust that has become the norm in many aspects of our common life. We see the polarization and demonization that is now common place in the political arena and experience division in our own families. Like you I often ask, "What can I do?" "What difference will I make?" We make a difference when we decide to speak the truth in love, when we chose to be healers of the broken and repairers of the torn. We live in divided times, yet God is doing a new thing in your life and in the life of the Church.

Our communities of worship have a unique role to play as healers, repairers, and restorers. A single act of healing put together with countless others, overwhelm the world. We gather to take the first step in faith towards a journey of healing and hope.

Come, let us walk together. God is doing a new thing.

The Rev. Traci Blackmon

The Rev. Traci Blackmon is an ordained UCC minister, public theologian, and published author whose life work focuses on communal resistance to systemic injustice.

"Pastor T" as she is affectionately called, has spent the last three decades preaching, teaching and living a theology that consistently and unapologetically calls community to hear the cries of the suffering in the world.



Rev. Blackmon is a native of Birmingham, AL, and is a distinguished Alumnus of Birmingham Southern College. She earned her Master of Divinity Degree and was awarded an honorary doctorate of ministry from Eden Theological Seminary in Webster Groves, MO, for her public ministry during the Ferguson uprising and beyond. She currently serves as theologian in residence for Eden Seminary and Regional Chaplain for the Central Region of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority, Inc.

The Rev. Kelly Brown Douglas

The Rev. Kelly Brown Douglas, Ph.D., is the Interim President of the Episcopal Divinity School in Cambridge, Massachusetts. Ordained in 1983, Douglas holds a master's degree in theology and a Ph.D. in systematic theology from Union Theological Seminary.

Before serving at Episcopal Divinity School, Douglas was the Dean of the Episcopal Divinity School at Union Theological Seminary in New York. She also serves as the Canon Theologian at the Washington National Cathedral in Washington, D.C. and Theologian in Residence at Trinity Church Wall Street in New York.

Douglas is the author of many articles and six books, including Sexuality and the Black Church: A Womanist Perspective, Stand Your Ground: Black Bodies and the Justice of God, and Resurrection Hope: A Future Where Black Lives Matter, which won the 2023 Grawemeyer Award in Religion. Her academic work has focused on womanist theology, sexuality and the Black church.



The Rev. John (Jack) Danforth

The Rev. Jack Danforth is an Episcopal priest, politician, attorney, author, and diplomat. He was born in St. Louis and graduated from Princeton University with an A.B. in religion and then received degrees from Yale Law School and Yale Divinity School.

His career in public service includes serving as the Attorney
General of Missouri from 1969 until 1976. He went on to serve as U.S. Senator from
Missouri from 1976 until 1995. Following his elected service, he was U.S.
Ambassador to the United Nations, and later, a special envoy to Sudan, where
his focus was negotiating an end to the civil war in the South. He was special
counsel in the investigation of the federal raid on the Branch Davidian
compound in Waco, Texas.

Danforth is the author of several books, including *Resurrection* (1994), *Faith and Politics: How the "Moral Values" Debate Divides America and How to Move Forward Together* (2006), and *The Relevance of Religion* (2015). He currently serves on the boards of the Cerner Corporation and the nonprofit, nonpartisan Commission on Presidential Debates. He is also on the national advisory board of the John C. Danforth Center on Religion and Politics at Washington University in St. Louis.

The Rev. Nontombi Naomi Tutu

The Rev. Naomi Tutu is the third child of Archbishop Desmond and Nomalizo Leah Tutu. She was born in South Africa. She was educated in Swaziland, the U.S. and England, and has divided her adult life between South Africa and the U.S.

The challenges of growing up black and female in apartheid South Africa have been the foundation of Naomi's life as an activist for human rights. Those experiences taught her that our whole human family loses when we accept situations of oppression, and how teaching and preaching hate and division injure us all.

After years spent as a development consultant, educator, and race and gender activist, she accepted her call to ordained ministries when she was in her 50's. She is an Episcopal priest who most recently was Associate Rector at All Saints' Episcopal Church in Beverly Hills, CA.
